



FEATURED ARTIST: Joel Reid



Message from the Director



As I sit down to write this, it serves as a good reminder of the value of living in the present moment—to take the time to enjoy and appreciate the people, places and things around me a little more before its gone. Like the seasons, the only constant is change. Thank you to all those of you who have come through our doors to make an investment of your time exploring exhibitions, programs, library and gift shop. For me one of the greatest rewards of my job comes through the watching, observing and listening to those who come through the gallery. It serves a great reminder of the incredible diversity of the lived experience, personal taste and the power art has as a visual language. The level of engagement and feedback is as diverse as the exhibitions, but every once in a while an exhibition inexplicably connects and resonates in a way that is totally unexpected.

The first indicator that some kind of mercurial magic is at play, is the length of time one disappears once they enter the gallery — which is only further emphasized by the surprise your feel when they once again emerge and you are reminded that they are here! The second clue is found in the number of repeat visits we see, often with friends in tow. This summer, it was so rewarding

and affirming to witness and relive that same emotional reaction I had when I stumbled across this artwork on the streets of Oaxaca, Mexico with all those who passed through the gallery or stumbled upon these works on the streets of Penticton. It's been a privilege to be able to share this with you all and I am hoping that it has sparked the imagination of all those who passed through our doors and saw the works wheat pasted throughout the community. I hope it might inspire us to reexamine how we live and interact with the visual arts and the potential it has to impact our lives, transform our public spaces, challenge our world view and engage us in meaningful public discourse.

Thanks to the BC Arts Council for their support of this project through the awarding of an Arts Impact Grant. As a result of this funding we will be sending at least two artists from our community to Oaxaca to undertake a residency. working in the collectives alongside these artists to learn and enhance their skills as artists. In keeping with the ethos of the Colectivo Subterráneos and Taller Artístico Comunitario, we hope to develop even more opportunities for artist exchanges as part of the ongoing legacy of this exhibition. Thank you to Ron Marsh for documenting all of our exhibitions; Kristine Lee, Dan McCune and Sarah Fahev for your help in not only installing the exhibition, but also wheat pasting these works throughout the community; my incredible team at the Penticton Art Gallery; all those who have walked through our doors this summer and all those who helped make what we do possible.

That being said, I am so excited about our upcoming exhibitions and I feel that they provide an interesting continuity to the conversations started this summer. Like our last show, these three exhibitions came together more through happenstance. Thanks to Laurie Landry who is taking on the role of guest curator for this exhibition, I was introduced to a whole group of artists whose work was largely unknown to me

previously. Laurie's proposed exhibit set the tone and I began to seek out potential artists whose work would complement the exhibition in the main gallery, or provide an interesting counterpoint to the conversation. It seemed the more I tried, the more contrived the conversation became. As soon as I let go and trusted in the process, I was introduced to two incredible artists. Thank you to Colleen Fox and Kathy Baker for reaching out introducing me to Ehteshamzadeh and Deborah Dowsett respectively. I couldn't think of a better fit and I am thrilled and honoured to be able to share their work with you all. As part of this exhibition we will also be offering drop-in life drawing in our main gallery every Saturday from 1:00pm— 3:00pm over the course of this exhibition. Come by and try your hand at drawing a still life.

I am also excited that we are able to offer ASL interpretation at our opening and for our artist talks — I hope that we can make this a standard part of our programming. To that end, I hope that you can let us know if this service would be of benefit to you or someone you know so we can ensure that we make appropriate arrangements to continue to provide this invaluable service in the future. We are committed to making the gallery a safe and inclusive place and ensuring that our programs are accessible to all. In order to achieve these goals, we ask for your help in this process. By letting us know how best we can meet your needs and by providing us with the knowledge, we can acquire tools and resources needed to make sure that the gallery is truly accessible for the benefit of our entire community.

It's a bit overwhelming looking at all the things we have planned for this fall, but a rolling stone gathers no moss. After almost three years of running at half throttle, we are excited to bring the gallery and our programming back up to full speed (and we hope that you will join us for the ride.) We have a full slate of public programming scheduled that is

deigned to spark your creativity, fuel your imagination, feed your soul, build community and inspire you to step outside of your routine and comfort zone. This is a symbiotic relationship and we require your participation and support in order that we not only survive, but thrive and flourish. I thank you all again for your time, interest, trust and ongoing support of not only the Penticton Art Gallery but our entire arts ecosystem — it's never been more important.

Just as I was coming to the end of this month's ramblings I received two emails from the Penticton & Wine Country Chamber of Commerce notifying me that the gallery that has been nominated in two award categories for the 35th Annual Business Excellence Awards. I can't express enough just how heartening and affirming it was to learn that someone from the community had nominated the gallery in the following two

categories: Not-for-Profit Excellence Award and the Workplace Culture Excellence Award. The nomination alone is an incredible tribute to the work done by our staff, board and our incredible community of volunteers whose collective efforts have combined to make the gallery the dynamic institution it is today. Thank you to the individuals who took the time to nominate the gallery this year. Regardless of the ultimate outcome of this process, the nomination alone is already a victory.

It is with great sadness that Mike's family announce his passing on May 15th, 2022 in Penticton, BC at the age of 87. Mike will be lovingly remembered by his wife Carole and children Paul, Fiona (Don), Katherine (Perry), David (Janet) and grandchildren Emily (Sean), Hannah, Ellie, Mia, great grandson Liam, and sister Mary Harris.

Art was Mike's passion in his retirement years where he devoted his time to pottery, drawing, and painting. He was recognized by the arts community with the 2018 Lifetime Achievement Award, given by the Penticton and District Community Arts Council. In 2020, Mike was the Meadowlark Nature Festival featured guest artist. His last solo exhibition was at the Penticton Art Gallery in January 2022.

Mike described his life as "a crazy, wonderful ride, aided and abetted by family, fellow artists, friends and strangers". He was a unique and charismatic character and will be greatly missed by many people. •

Alphons Witteman (1941-2022)



Alphons Witteman passed away at home with his loving wife by his side on Friday July 22, at the age of 80 1/2 from a sudden heart attack following complications of heart disease and a recent car accident. He lived 35 years longer thanks to medical intervention and for those gifted years we are profoundly grateful. Alphons is survived by his loving family: his wife of 55 years Nel, their daughters Marjolein (Dave) and Annette (Michael) and grandchildren Colette, Deanna,

Jasper and Grace. In the Netherlands he was predeceased by his brothers Louis (Els) and Martin (Nel) and sister Hannie, and leaves behind two sisters Ineke and Laura. He will be fondly remembered by his extended family and friends in the Netherlands and by his friends and neighbours in the South Okanagan where he and his family immigrated to in 1978.

Alphons will be remembered for his twinkly blue eyes, his happy smile, his outgoing attitude and zest for life. He and his wife Nel were never shy to be the first ones out on the dance floor to get the party going. He played piano by ear like Liberace and had a flair for improvisation. From a career in sales in Europe to orcharding in Kaleden, building homes and selling real estate, owning a cafe and finally owning The Lloyd Gallery, Alphons, always with Nel by his side, was driven to succeed. He didn't mind the hard work to make dreams become reality even when faced with adversity. He loved visiting the artists in their studios and working with art collectors over 35 years. In his retirement years he was very fond of the good life in his flower garden watching the birds and bees, and cooking delicious soups. •

Guest Curator: Laurie M. Landry

Over the past 15 years or so I have had the great pleasure of following the career of Laurie Landry whom I first met up in Wells. Over this time I have seen her develop her practice and gain her voice moving from being predominantly a landscape artist, through abstraction and to the figure. I have also been able to work with her in a number of capacities, including having her be a part of a group exhibition last year. I have always admired her commitment to her practice and I am excited that she accepted my

offer to guest curate an exhibition this year. I am thrilled to share her unique journey and perspective with our community through her exhibition.

In talking about the intent behind the exhibition Laurie writes, "Figurative art can be a form of claiming your space, whatever your space may be. Creating a presence - or even an absence of presence. The viewer is forced to acknowledge the presence of the figure, the person. Historically, artists like Alexandre Cabanel like to paint aesthetically pleasing things, and

that is extended to the figures—hence, the "the male gaze". Think of the many historical paintings in which the youthful woman is the focal subject, often for the rich, male patron of the artist. Contemporary figurative art has broken away from the powerful, the rich, the white man, or the beautiful, flawless maiden as a subject, but incorporating the contemporary world we live in, full of diversity. Black, Indigenous, Asian, queer, body positive and/or disabled figures are spotlighted." •

ASL INTERPRETER WILL BE IN ATTENDANCE

A.J. Brown is a self-taught artist, photographer and poet from West Vancouver. Aside from being Deaf and having Cerebral Palsy she has developed a distinct voice that is uniquely her own, using brushstrokes and mark making to transcend her physical limitations. "Creating is my way to express my soul-voice in a way to which others can hear and respond. When I create, it feels like something spiritual guides me. I need to continue on my spiritual path, and that is through expressing myself. Art connects me to my Spiritual Self. My art flows from my Spiritual Self."

Annette Nieukerk's artistic practice spans five decades, multiple disciplines, media and genre. "As a young artist, I depicted the prairie landscape using silkscreen printing as my medium of choice. In midcareer, I became passionately involved in theatre design and followed that path for many years while still maintaining my role as an art educator." Today she works out of a studio in East Vancouver utilizing a variety of mixed painting and drawing media employing the aging human figure as the focus of her practice. "Always having a passion for figurative work, I find that as I age I am no longer content to portray youthful lithesome bodies that have throughout history been the subject of figurative paintings."

Sára Molčan's larger-than-life selfies examine contemporary society's growing sense of insecurity and our culture's desire to seek meaning from the meaningless. Her paintings are a calculated and critical performance of self, dictated through the ever-present yearning for likes and comments to fill the emotional void in the digital era. "I often deal with relationships, trauma, and mental illness in my work. I try to emphasize this in my paintings by playing with the idea of muddled psychology with the hint of facial features visible beneath clouds of colour and fervent brushstrokes."

Nicole Sleeth's work centers the female figure as an exploration of power, connection, and lived experience. Through textured, fleshlike oil paint, she captures the essence of a person through a period of time, portraying the full humanity, agency, and complexity of the women she paints, literally taking up space through the scale of the work. "I like painting skin, I like painting women's bodies, I love the way people look. I think it's fascinating, and I would love to see more curiosity about it. There's just so much variation. As a society, at least in this part of the world, I think we are too comfortable with voicing our approval or disapproval of women, particularly their appearance."

Laurie M. Landry is a curator, activist and visual artist whose practice focuses on portraiture and the figurative arts. Her figurative work increasingly challenges the unrealistic beauty standards which have increasingly dictated how we are 'supposed' to look, in favor of celebrating what we actually look like. "My portraits of Deaf and disabled people respond to traditions in portraiture through a contemporary lens. My work reflects my own experience as a part of a marginalized community, and I engage with my subjects with dignity and compassion. My large oil paintings convey contemporary subjects and offer the viewer a way to understand and relate across universal boundaries."

FROM DARKNESS TO LIGHT

Artist Talk Saturday Sept. 24th 1:00 – 2:00 pm

My interest in art began early. In grade school I excelled in art and always felt deep down that I was an artist. In 1982, I began attending the Alberta College of Art, but due to a severe eating disorder and drinking issues, I dropped out after my second year. I was ashamed and felt like a failure. I grew up in a very dysfunctional household, which took years to overcome. I felt disconnected from others and very self conscious and in need of constant approval.

After two back surgeries and two children, I began needing pain medication to help me cope with the duties of being a wife and mother.

In 1992, I began painting watercolours as well as doing murals and theatre sets. Unfortunately after being prescribed Oxycontin for my pain, my problem with drugs became a battle. When my doctor realized that I was abusing my medication he stopped giving me anything for pain control. This began a cycle of street drug use that would eventually take me to the

downtown east side of Vancouver. I remember walking the dark and lonely streets at night. When it got late and the traffic would slow down, the constant buzzing of the street lamps, became deafening. I was alone in a scary situation. Other addicts became my friends. I listened to their stories of how they ended up in the same position. One woman I met began using heroin after her daughter was murdered. I met many people who like me, began because of prescribed medication. A common thread was always untreated childhood trauma.

No one decides to become homeless and addicted. These people are fathers, mothers, sisters, brothers, and our children. This is a mental health issue, not a criminal one, and has nothing to do with morality. I just watched a documentary on the drug crisis. Twice as many people have died of drug overdoses during the Covid pandemic, then all the people who have died from Covid. This gave me a sense of the scale of the drug crisis we are facing all over the world. I felt compelled to paint not just my story, but that of all the other's struggling with the never ending cycle of addiction. •

A JOURNEY THROUGH SCOLIOSIS

Artist Talk Saturday Sept. 24th 2:00 – 3:00 pm, with Dance Performance by Nikki Schenk

A Journey Through Scoliosis art project started with my personal mental journey through scoliosis. I have been dealing with scoliosis since I was seven years old. Throughout these years, aside from the dreadful physical pain that I have experienced, there've been mental challenges. Especially during my teenage years, I had a poor body image because of my curved spine. I was ashamed to wear clothes that showed my body. embarrassed to wear swimsuits, and disliked my body and posture. However, after getting to know my body more and after being introduced to Iyengar yoga, I slowly stopped hating my half-moonshaped spine. One day, as I looked at my body in the mirror, I realized how beautiful the curve on my back was and how it reminded me of all the curved lines in nature, like the spinal leaves of flowers. That's where A Journey Through Scoliosis started. With a photo, I decided to put my scoliosis under the spotlight. So, with this project, I aim to praise scoliosis bodies, display their beauty, and raise awareness of scoliosis and its mental side effects.

Anxiety and having a poor body image are two of the most common mental side effects of scoliosis. I have

been dealing with severe anxiety for a long time, and only after getting to know my curved spine did I realize a significant part of my anxiety comes from my scoliosis. Speaking to people with scoliosis, I discovered that they, too, have been struggling with anxiety and poor body image. We only realize we are going through the same thing; we experience the same barriers and fight the same battles once we share our mental journeys. Therefore, a prominent part of this project is based on shared experiences. This project is an invitation through art for all scoliosis bodies to share their mental journeys with scoliosis and embrace their curves. •



Just like the branches of the trees, routes of the rivers, and the paths the wind creates on the sand, curved spines are beautiful. They each have a story to tell.



ABOUT NIKKI:

Nikki is a contemporary dancer currently working in Vancouver, BC. She began her professional training in Victoria, BC at Ballet Victoria Conservatory where she did intensive training in ballet and contemporary dance. During her high school years Nikki also practiced in many other styles, including jazz, hip hop, and tap. Although Nikki is focusing on her career as a professional dancer, she has also had many experiences teaching and choreographing for local studios and programs around Victoria. Throughout her career, Nikki has faced challenges as she's journeyed through her scoliosis. 

Hello from the Summerland Potters Guild! We are a non-profit, voluntary, group of experienced potters based out of Summerland, BC. We provide a studio equipped with everything needed to create hand-built and wheel-thrown pottery right on site, including wheels, molds, glazes, kilns and so much more.

We participate in chosen events like this one to help showcase our potter's work and sell our creations to raise funds for our guild to help with operating costs and to make donations to various causes. Most pieces will have our member's personal mark on the bottom, along with our acronym 'SPG' for Summerland Potters Guild.

Did you know one bowl can take several weeks to make? Here are the basic steps one of our soup bowls goes through to be created—First, it's made on the wheel or hand built to have the shape the potter desires. Then it has to dry to 'leather-hard' (not completely dry,

but firm enough to handle) and it gets trimmed to its final shape, then the piece is required to fully dry over several days. Once completely dry (called bone dry), it gets fired in the kiln to harden the clay, then we dip or brush it with glaze (the glaze starts like liquid paint). After the glaze is applied it has to fully dry again, then it goes into the kiln for the final firing that turns it into the beautiful piece you see. After it's fired, the bottoms get sanded, and then it's finished!

Interested in becoming a member? We have spots available for experienced potters! Memberships are based on a 1-year commitment and our studio is located at 13202 Victoria Rd N, Summerland, BC. As our guild is non-profit and volunteer-run, we have a voluntary executive that takes care of the administration work, and each guild member takes care of a job to help keep our costs down such as loading the kilns, ordering supplies, cleaning, and more. In addition, an evening of readings by the festival's presenters will be open to public Friday, September 23rd. Tickets available at the door. ◆







Sometimes art is abstract and seemingly nonsensical, but sometimes it is realistic and clear in what it is depicting. Sketches such as these were ways to memorialize people, events or places; the same way we take photos on our phones today.

In 1849 Julia Bullock-Webster drew this sketch of a woman. This sketch is the second oldest piece of art in the gallery's permanent collection. This sketch was created in England, before she came to the Okanagan to visit relatives.



This sketch was done using graphite on paper. Graphite has been used in art for centuries. It was first discovered in England, during the 16th century. It quickly developed multiple uses, ranging from military moulds to art. Modern graphite wasn't invented until the end of the 18th century, when embargoes restricted the supply of graphite coming from England to the rest of Europe. This mixing of graphite powder and clay, allowed for the spread of graphite manufacturing outside of England. Graphite is prized in art for its versatility. Varying the thickness and hardness of the graphite gives different results when drawing. Multiple layers or overlapping lines can provide shading and depth to an image. Unlike paint or ink, graphite is easily removed, whether for correction or as part of the artistic process, from an image. lacktriangle
